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

An update on the Statutory Committee: The PORA statutory committee did meet with management on October 27, 2023. We will share the outcome at the December 3 meeting along with the minutes of that


meeting. All and all, we all felt it was a good meeting with sharing of ideas. With the Christmas Season upon us, Plantation Oaks Resident Association

CHRISTMAS COOKIES

cookies lies ages ago, in solstice rituals conducted long before Christmas became the huge commercial holiday it is today. Winter solstice festivals have been held for eons. From Norway to West

Africa, Ireland to India, groups of people gathered to celebrate the changing of the

seasons. By the middle ages, the Christmas holiday had overtaken solstice rituals throughout much of presentday Europe. Spices like nutmeg, cinnamon and black pepper were just starting to be widely used, and dried exotic fruits like citron, apricots and dates added sweetness and texture to the dessert tray. These items, along with ingredients like sugar, lard, and butter, would have been prized as expensive delicacies by medieval cooks. Only on the most important holiday could families afford treats like these. And unlike pies or cakes, cookies could be easily shared and given to friends and neighbors. Our modern Christmas cookies date back to these medieval gifts.

Though cookies have come a long way since medieval times, some things haven't changed. Many Christmas cookies are still heavily spiced. We think of "traditional" Christmas flavors like cinnamon, nutmeg and ginger, and those are exactly the same spices medieval cooks would have used in their cookies ages ago. Gingerbread is a classic Christmas cookie, and yet it's also a cookie that would have tasted strikingly similar back in the middle ages. Ginger, cinnamon, nutmeg and mace combine to make a snappy, spicy taste, just like they would have back then. And gingerbread uses molasses as a sweetener, something that medieval cooks would appreciate as refined sugar was so expensive. These cooks would not have made gingerbread men, however. The first person to try that was none other than Queen Elizabeth I of England, who had the cookie molded into the shapes of her favorite courtiers.

Today's cookies demonstrate the great influence of many different cultures. Every family has their favorite holiday cookies that they have been eating with their families for decades. What are yours?

Here are two of mine!

Crispy Gingersnaps

Yield: 40 ginger snaps



Ingredients:

2 cups all-purpose flour 1 tbsp. ground ginger powder

- 1 tsp baking soda
- 1 tsp ground cinnamon
- 1/4 tsp ground cloves
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 2/3 cups butter
- 3/4 cups sugar
- 1/2 cup packed brown sugar
- 1 large egg
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1 tsp cider vinegar
- 3 Tbsp. crystallized ginger, cut into small dice

Instructions:

- 1. Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Line baking sheets with parchment paper.
- 2. In the bowl of an electric mixer with a paddle attachment, beat butter and sugars until creamy and lightened in color, about 3 minutes.
- 3. Add egg and mix for one minute. Scrape down sides, add vanilla and vinegar, and mix for one minute. Add dry ingredients in three batches, until just combined, do not over mix.
- 4. Using a rubber spatula, fold crystallized ginger into mix.
- 5. Form dough into a log on parchment or wax paper and roll into a log. Refrigerate for at least one hour (or you can freeze them at this point and bring out for a later date). Cut cookie dough log into 1/4" coins. Place on baking sheet about 1 inch apart.
- 6. Bake 9-11 minutes until golden brown. Let rest for 4 minutes and then using a thin spatula, move cookies carefully to a cooling rack. Let cool completely.
- 7. Store in a metal tin or plastic container for up to 3 weeks, or freeze.

Gingerbread Amaretti Cookies (gluten-free)

The classic Italian cookie gets a new gingerbread twist. Don't overbake—they should be slightly chewy. Yield: 2 dozen

Ingredients

1 can almond paste, (8 ounces) 3/4 cup sugar

- 1 tablespoon baking cocoa
- 1 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 1 Dash ground cloves
- 2 large egg whites, room temperature
- 2 tablespoons molasses



1 cup pearl or coarse sugar **Instructions**

- 1. Preheat oven to 375°. Crumble almond paste into a food processor; add sugar, baking cocoa and spices. Pulse until combined. Add egg whites and molasses, process until smooth.
- 2. Drop by tablespoonfuls into pearl sugar; roll to coat. Place 2 in. apart on parchment-lined baking sheets.



Bake until set, 10-12 minutes. Cool for a couple minutes before removing from pans to wire racks. Store in an airtight container.

2023 BUYERS: LOT RENT INCREASE/ ADJUSTED MARKET VALUE FOR 2024

If you bought a house during 2023, your lot rent will be subject to a <u>one-</u> <u>time</u> "*Adjusted Market Value*", effective January 2024. This action was explained at the time of buying the house. The lot rent to be paid was

presented at the time of the resident application and when you signed your lot rental agreement with community management. It could be one of the following, which includes Spectrum services:

- Value lot: \$1,010.30
- Estate lot: \$1,071.30
- Premium Lot: \$1,098.30

All land-leased manufactured home community owners are allowed to bring lot rents up to a "market value" that they feel is competitive with other communities in the area, only when a house sells/ changes owners. As residents/sales agents, we can share that Plantation Oaks is still in an attractive lot rent range for the services included in our lot rent, and quality of the community we live in.

If you bought a house this year, you may question why the market adjustment, in some cases, is a big jump for next year? When you buy a house in Plantation Oaks, you have the right to assume the lot rent that your seller was paying until the end of the year. If your seller was the original owner, their lot rent was probably in the \$700-\$800 range. However, in January 2024, the <u>market adjustment</u> will be applied, which will increase your monthly lot rent to one of the rents listed above.

Starting in 2025, and subsequent years, your lot rent will be increased by one of the following, depending on your prospectus for your lot:

- <u>Prospectus 1</u> 5% or Consumer Price Index (CPI), whichever is greater.
- <u>Prospectus 2</u> \$10 or Consumer Price Index (CPI), whichever is greater.

AD VALOREM TAX:

This tax is allowed to be passed on to all 377 homes at Plantation Oaks each year. January 1, 2024, you will need to pay \$286.15 for your pro rata share of the ad valorem tax for the previous year. If Four Star agents handled your purchase transaction; you were credited at closing for the months that the seller owned the home.

We understand that the process of buying a home can be overwhelming. Hopefully, you found this review helpful!

Any time you can spend a cool October morning in the beautiful back creeks of Flagler and catch six snook, that's a pretty good day and we were feeling pretty enthusiastic. lifetime. The next several fish were giant Redfish but all too big to keep. Redfish are a slot fish meaning a keeper must be between 18-27 inches with a bag limit of one per day per fisherman. It's not often a fisherman finds himself trying to catch smaller fish, but we were



finally able to catch two keepers. Add the Cubera Snapper and we had quite a haul and a memorable day. Two days later, Butch and Sharon and Glenda and I got together for a delicious fish dinner - topping off one of the best Christmas gifts I've gotten in years, even if it was still October.


