


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THE TURTLE TRAIL

You may have noticed that there are turtles amoung us in our county,



where they are both cherished and protected.

While there are many real turtles, colorful fiberglass sculptures can also be found in various locations. The FC3 Turtle Trail is a community sculpture project using the Loggerhead sea turtle as the model. They can be found in many areas throughout Palm Coast and the Flagler Beaches.

Our region's most iconic public art project doubles as a scavenger hunt that families can enjoy together. The Flagler County Cultural Council's Turtle Trail showcases 22 large fiberglass turtles, each uniquely painted and placed in parks and other public spaces. The turtles, which are created by a fiberglass artist in Nebraska and shipped to Flagler Beach for design, are a tribute to the large Loggerhead species found along the coast.

What began as a single turtle unveiled in 2018 is now a trail of 22, the last of which was dedicated on August 21, 2024. Go to visitflagler.com and click on Public Art Trail to view or download the printable guide. You can seek out the turtle painted to resemble the cartoon character Garfield or track down the turtles designed like Vincent Van Gogh's "Cafe Terrace at Night" or Claude Monet's water lilies. You'll walk away creatively inspired and will see much of Palm Coast and the Flagler Beaches' beautiful scenery along the way. Plan a fun day of hunting for the turtles with your holiday guests, young and old.

GOODBYE, KMART SHOPPERS

The last full-scale Kmart in the continental US recently closed in Bridgehampton, New York. This event marked the end of an era for the once-iconic retailer.

Known for its "Blue Light Specials" flash discount announcements—and celebrity partnerships, the chain struggled over the years to compete with Walmart, Target, and online retailers.

Founded in 1899 as SS Kresge, the first Kmart branch opened in 1962. It was a pioneer in discount retailing. At its peak in the 1980s, annual revenues exceeded \$36B with over 2,000 stores. By 1986, the store was the second-largest retailer behind Sears. Kmart eventually filed for bankruptcy in 2002 and again in 2018, primarily due to mismanagement, unsuccessful acquisitions, outdated store locations, and a failure to adapt to the rise of online shopping. After merging with Sears in 2005, both brands suffered losses, and Kmart's remaining stores gradually closed. Only a small Kmart outlet in Miami, and a few locations in Guam and the US Virgin Islands, remain.

Editor Dana's Note: As a young mother of four in the 60's, Kmart was my go-to store for Christmas gift layaways. We didn't have credit cards back then so I paid as much as I could each week until they were paid off and I could bring them home – ahh-memories.

DISH FOR HOLIDAY COOKING Tasty And Easy Holiday Brunch Soufflé! *By Chef Kevin Gallagher MS, CEC*



I LOVE THIS RECIPE! This is the easiest cheese soufflé ever thanks to a genius (accidental) shortcut from Jacques Pépin's mom. This recipe can easily be cut in half or even in thirds! You can use one large 6 cup soufflé dish, 4 small gratin dishes (like the

picture) or even 12 4-oz ramekins. Just remember to decrease cooking time for smaller dishes. My 4 gratins only took 25-30 minutes, the 4-oz ramekins will take even less time.

"When my mother got married," says Jacques, "she was seventeen and my father was twenty-two. She did not know how to cook, but my father liked cheese soufflé, so my mother graciously obliged. She had never made a soufflé before, but a friend told her that it consisted

of a white sauce (béchamel), grated cheese, and eggs – a cinch! To the béchamel, that staple of the French home cook, she added her grated Swiss cheese and then cracked and added one egg after another to the mixture, stirred it well, poured it into a gratin dish, and baked it in the oven. Voilà! No one had told her that the eggs should



be separated, with the yolks added to the base sauce and the whites whipped to a firm consistency and then gently folded into the mixture. Ignorance is bliss, and in this case, it was indeed: the soufflé rose to a golden height and became a family favorite. This is a great recipe that can be assembled hours or even a day ahead, and although it is slightly less airy than a standard soufflé, it is delicious."

Serves: 4-6

Ingredients

6 tablespoons unsalted butter (¾ stick), plus more for each baking dish

6 tablespoons all-purpose flour

2 cups cold whole milk

¹/₂ teaspoon each salt and freshly ground black pepper 6 large eggs

2 ¹/₂ cups grated Swiss cheese, preferably Gruyère (about 6 ounces)

3 tablespoons fresh chives, minced

Grated Parmigiano-Reggiano cheese, for coating the baking dishes

Preparation

- 1. Preheat oven to 400°F with a rack positioned in the middle.
- 2. Butter a 6-cup gratin dish (or 4 small gratin dishes or 12 4oz ramekins), coat the insides with finely grated Parmesan cheese, then set aside. Melt butter in saucepan, add the flour and mix with a whisk to make a roux. Cook for 30-60 seconds, add the milk at once, then mix it with a whisk (it's now a bechamel sauce). Keep whisking until it thickens and comes to a strong boil, about 2 minutes. It should be thick and smooth. Stir in salt and pepper. Cool sauce for at least 10-15 minutes.
- 3. Break the eggs into a bowl and beat well with a fork. Add 1/3 of the cooled bechamel sauce and mix thoroughly with a whisk. Add the remaining bechamel and mix again until smooth. Mix in Swiss cheese and chives. Pour into the buttered gratin dish(es), add a sprinkle of Parmigiano-Reggiano and additional grated Gruyere on top (if desired). You can **cook now** or cover and refrigerate **up to one day ahead**.
- 4. Bake for 30 to 40 minutes, or until the soufflé is puffy and well browned on top. Although it will stay inflated for quite a while, it is best served immediately.

Variations: Add fresh thyme, or smoked salmon, dill, and Emmental cheese, or finely chopped ham and cheddar cheese. Use your imagination!

We will also be looking for volunteers to help wrap these gifts through mid-December. Please help. Contact Donna Copeland 704-886-7706



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
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AUTHENTIC POLISH DINNER

October 18, 2024, Stan Niedzwieki and his helpers presented a wonderful authentic Polish dinner at the clubhouse for over 100 residents. Everything was made from scratch. Following dinner, attendees enjoyed munching on delicious homemade cookies – by Patty Watkins – as they were entertained by the local jazz band. A delightful evening for all. Our thanks to those hard workers that prepared the food, set up the room, served and cleaned up! The following Polish Kraut recipe was requested by many of the attendees.

POLISH KRAUT

Serves 10 2 large cans kraut 1 small head cabbage 2 onions 1/2 lb. salt pork 3 cups chicken broth

1/2 lb. pork steaks4 tablespoons butter2 tablespoon floursalt & pepper

Shred cabbage and par boil.

Rinse kraut 3 times in warm water.

Mix cabbage with kraut.

Cut salt pork and port steaks in $\frac{1}{4}$ inch cubes and fry down.

Sauté onions in salt pork and pork steak mixture. Pour meat mixture in cabbage and kraut mixture. Melt butter, add flour and cook until butter is brown, and mixture is slightly thick.

Pour over Kraut mixture and mix.

Add chicken broth and slow boil, or less, for one hour – stir to keep from sticking.
