THE LAKE By Joanne Kegel



If you've ever been to New England, you may have been to or heard of Lake Winnipesaukee in New Hampshire, fondly called "The Lake". Located at the foothills of the White Mountains in the Lakes Region, the scenery is beautiful and the water pristine.

I went to the Lake every summer to Meredith since I was a kid. An uncle owned a cottage with direct waterfront access on two sides with a dock on a peninsula called Spindle Point. He always had a Chris Craft boat and the cousins all learned to water ski. I was also able to get up for a spin, sometimes. We even went to church by boat! Every town has a quaint downtown area with free public dockage.

The Lake is the third largest Lake in New England. It is nearly 21 miles long, from 1 to 9 miles wide, covering 71 square miles, with a maximum depth of 180 feet. There are 258 islands.



The Lake is in a year-round vacation area, with swimming and boating in the summer, leaf peeping in the fall and snow skiing in the winter. In summer, there is a cruise boat called "The Mount Washington", named after the tallest mountain in the Northeast.



"The Mount" would go by my uncle's cottage every day and blow the horn. The M/S Mount

Washington is a first-class vintage **230-foot** excursion ship offering daily scenic cruises as well as sunset and dinner dance cruises. It has 2 banquet rooms with inside and upper deck bars. We have taken many cruises across the lake to Wolfeboro, an artsy, quaint port of call, from Weirs Beach in Laconia, where you can get off the boat to shop or have lunch and get back on to return to the Weirs dock. Weirs Beach is a public beach with a boardwalk, ice cream and caramel corn shops, penny arcades, and a marina. A lot has changed as the shops now sell mostly souvenirs and arcades are now video arcades. But the charm of old Victorian houses is still there, with new condos mixed in. Meredith is built up now with gorgeous (and expensive) hotels. There is even a big hotel where my church used to be, called "Church Landing". You'll find good food, a tiki bar, and an old mill factory with a waterfall called "Mills Falls". They kept the original building and made country store style shops inside attached to another hotel. The old wooden floors still creek and that's where our favorite Italian pizza place is.

"Up the road a piece" is Squam Lake where "On Golden Pond" was filmed. It is still a quiet and beautiful place. The lakes are 2 hours from Boston, where I grew up.

When I met Dave in CT years later, I learned that he too grew up going there. In fact, his parents were living there and had boat on Lake Winnisquam. We started going up for winter or summer vacations together. We both knew the area so well and found our favorite restaurants and pubs. And it's near Loudon raceway! Relatives have long since passed, but our memories of The Lake will never leave us. We will try to visit again when we vacation in CT in summer.

Christmas but Judy told her Wally was getting her a ring. Judy worked with a man whose cousin owned a





TAKE A WALK ON THE WILD SIDE

A few months back I wrote an article "Beauty and the Beast" about our beautiful community and some of the creatures that live here (besides us), yet I was totally unprepared for a chance meeting with one of our state's almost mythical critters, a "Florida panther".

It was early December 22 and Glenda and I (with a few neighbors) were riding around looking at the Christmas lights when, on Galemont Drive, a panther ran from between some houses directly in front of the van. The other occupants in the van were deep in conversation and I was the only one looking forward, thus no one else saw this cat. Though he was running very fast, I got a good look and that is why I refer to this kitty-cat as a "He". The next day I did some online research (as follows) and confirmed his sex and how incredibly rare it is to see a "Florida panther", but mostly I was interested in his eating habits, particularly if they ate Italian food.

Florida panther adults are dark buff, tawny, or a rust color and the male are relatively large weighing 100-160 pounds and the females 65-100 pounds. I believe the one I saw was at least 100 pounds (however when he first ran in front of me, I would have told you he weighed 3 tons and was the size of a T-Rex) which is why I believe this cat was a male. Panthers have long tails unlike the short bobtail of a bobcat and strongly resemble female African lions. Historically there are a few newspaper articles that date back more than a century of panther attacks on humans, although now wildlife experts agree that in modern times, there have been no verified panther attacks on a person in Florida" (Italian or otherwise). There ARE, however, many verified attacks on pets and farm animals which is not surprising since a panther's main diet consist of deer, wild hogs, birds, and raccoon. So goat, sheep, calves, dogs and cats are also on the fast-food menu. The Florida panther's status is listed as endangered. There are just over 200 left in the wild. They are mostly found in southern Florida swampland, making this sighting very rare, but this wasn't the only sighting.

A week earlier while walking our fur babies at night, I saw deep yellow/amber eyes watching me from the preserve area next to my home. Whatever was there did not run or blink, so I cut the walk short. A few days after my sighting Glenda saw a buck chasing a panther out of the woods along the banks of the lake. We googled this and sure enough deer will chase a panther off that's trying to sneak up on them. So, after years of wandering around the Everglades National Park and the Big Cypress National Preserve, I finally get to see a Florida panther and I can check that off my list. Been there, done that and don't want to do that again!

I KNOW WHEN I'M THIRSTY!

Are you sure about that? The truth is, as you get older it is common for your sense of thirst to diminish. So, if you're over 60, and think you're drinking less water than you used to, it's probably not your imagination.

Humans can only survive a few days

without water, so it makes sense that thirst is a basic survival instinct; everyone gets thirsty. But the ability to sense thirst decreases as people age making it important for people over 60 to hydrate even if you don't feel thirsty.

How do we lose our sense of thirst?

Let's begin with an example of how thirst works to help explain the process. Typically, as you eat a bunch of salty snacks, you think to yourself, "I'm so thirsty! I need something to drink right now!" The reason that happens is that the salty snacks raise your blood sodium concentration too much, and your hypothalamus (located in your brain) puts out a strong feeling of thirst. So, what happens? You drink something. Easy.

However, as we age, the message from our brain that's supposed to notify us when we're thirsty loses strength, and we don't get the message resulting in dehydration.

Why does dehydration matter for older people?

Dehydration can cause serious complications like urinary tract infections, kidney stones, and kidney failure. It can also be responsible for an extremely serious, and sometimes life-threatening complication, low blood volume (hypovolemic shock) which can cause a drop in blood pressure and a drop in the amount of oxygen in your body.

Signs of dehydration include

- Little or no urination
- dark or amber-colored urine
- Dry skin that stays tented or folded when pinched
- Irritability, dizziness, or confusion
- Low blood pressure
- Rapid breathing and heartbeat
- Weak pulse
- Cold hands and feet
- Constipation
- Dry Mouth
- Sunken eyes
- Difficulty walking

How can you increase hydration?

Drinking plain water all the time can get a little boring. Luckily, there are lots of new and improved options, starting with some cool, reusable bottles. Some of those bottles can infuse natural flavors into the water inside, and even keep their contents cold or warm for hours. A couple of other ideas you may want to try:

- Broth and soup provide both hydration and nutrition.
- Place water bottles in multiple locations around the home.
- Include foods with high water content such as cucumbers, oranges, or watermelon.
- So, "Let's get drinking!"

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THE FIRST SUPER BOWL

Though the NFL officially formed in 1920, the Super Bowl wasn't played until more than 40 years later.

In 1960, a group of businessmen who wanted to own football franchises, but were denied by the NFL, launched an alternative league, known as the

American Football League (AFL).

For several years, the NFL and AFL were rivals, competing for fans, players, and support. Then, in 1966, owners negotiated an agreement to merge the leagues by 1970.

The first Super Bowl, which featured the AFL (Kansas City Chiefs) and NFL champion (Green Bay Packers), was played on January 15, 1967. The game was originally called the "AFL-NFL World Championship Game." Later, Chiefs owner Lamar Hunt proposed using the term "Super Bowl" to refer to the championship game.

After the leagues merged, the NFL split into two conferences: the American Football Conference (AFC) and the National Football Conference (NFC). The champions of each play in the Super Bowl.

In Super Bowl I, the NFL champion Green Bay Packers defeated the AFL champion Kansas City Chiefs, 35-10, on January 15, 1967, at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum. Although ticket prices averaged \$12, the game was not a sellout—the only non-sellout in the game's history. The game drew 61,000 fans and was televised by CBS and NBC.

Super Bowl 2023 will be held Feb. 12, 2023, The Super Bowl 57 will be held in Glendale, Arizona, at the State Farm Stadium, with the average ticket selling for \$8,650 and \$23,795 for the best seats.

FEBRUARY IS CELEBRATION OF CHOCOLATE MONTH

Valentine's Day is **the 14th of February, and** it seems that everyone associates this day with chocolate. It's no wonder that February is dedicated as the National Celebration of Chocolate Month!

One of my favorite desserts is chess pie. It is so easy to make and there

are many variations you can make... from buttermilk, lemon, nut, and, of course, chocolate!

Chess pie was brought from England originally and was found in New England as well as Virginia but is more associated with deep south cuisine. It has some similarities to English lemon curd pie. It is likely derived from recipes for cheese-less cheesecake that appeared in cookbooks as early as the 17th century, such as in Martha Washington's "Booke of Cookery" and the English "A True Gentlewoman's Delight" (1653). A recipe explicitly called "Chess Pie" appeared in the 1877 cookbook by Estelle Woods Wilcox, Buckeye Cookery.

Below is my version of the chocolate chess pie. Chocolate and orange really go together well, so I paired my pie with an orange-flavored whipped cream. Of course, if you want to be a purist, omit the orange flavor and stick with vanilla! It will still be delish!

Chocolate Chess Pie

Servings: 8

Ingredients

- 2 large eggs, lightly beaten
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- ¹/₄ cup butter, melted

1¹/₂ cups sugar

4 tablespoons cocoa

1 can evaporated milk, (5.33 ounce can)

1 pie shell, unbaked

1 cup whipping cream

2 tablespoons confectioner's sugar

1 tablespoon Grand Marnier, (or Cointreau) (optional) 1 tablespoon semi-sweet chocolate, shaved Instructions

1. Mix sugar and cocoa with a whisk in a bowl so there are no lumps in the cocoa. Add the beaten eggs and slowly whisk them in completely. Whisk in the evaporated milk and vanilla for two minutes longer until it no longer feels gritty and watery. Mixture will be very liquid... don't be alarmed! 2. Pour into unbaked pie shell. 3. Bake at 350 °F for 35-45 minutes until set in center. Cool completely.

4. Beat whipping cream and confectioner's sugar until soft peaks. Add Grand Marnier and whip until stiff peaks.

5. Spread over completely cooled pie to form second layer Garnish with shaved chocolate. Refrigerate at least 1 hour before cutting.



"CANDLE WITH CARE"

 Blow out all candles when you leave the room or go to bed. Avoid the use of candles in the bedroom



and other areas where people may fall asleep.

- 2. Keep candles at least 1 foot (30 centimeters) away from anything that can burn.
- 3. Think about using flameless candles in your home. They look and smell like real candles.

If you Do burn candles, make sure that you...

- 1. Use candle holders that are sturdy and won't tip over easily.
- 2. Put candle holders on a sturdy, uncluttered surface.
- Light candles carefully. Keep your hair and any
 a) loose clothing away from the flame.
- 4. Don't burn a candle all the way down. Put it out before it gets too close to the holder or container.
- 5. Never use a candle if oxygen is used in the home.
- 6. Have flashlights and battery-powered lighting ready to use during a power outage. Never use candles.

Never ever put water in a burning candle. The hot melted wax mixed with water will cause an explosion that can seriously injure you and damage your home.

From 2015-2019 U.S. fire departments responded to an estimated 7,400 home structure fires that were started by candles per year. These fires caused an annual average of 90 deaths, 670 injuries and \$291 million in direct property damage.

Many of us won't see the changes, but our kids and grandkids probably will.

- 21. In the USA, young lawyers already don't get jobs. (Tesla, Apple, Google) will do the revolutionary approach and build a computer on wheels.

- 29. Look at what Volvo is doing right now; no more internal combustion engines in their vehicles starting this year with the 2019 models using all-electric or hybrid only, with the intent of phasing out the hybrid models.
- 30. Many engineers from Volkswagen and Audi are completely terrified of Tesla – and they should be. Look at all the companies offering all-electric vehicles. That was unheard of only a few years ago.
- 31. Insurance companies will have massive trouble because, without accidents, the costs will become cheaper. Their auto insurance business model will disappear.
- 32. Real estate will change. If you can work from home (or from literally anywhere), people will abandon their towers to move far away to more beautiful affordable locations.
- Electric cars will become mainstream about 2030. Cities will be less noisy because all new cars will run on electricity.
