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
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SALVATION ARMY SHELTER

I have a close relative in Boston who has been



homeless at times - most recently 2 years ago. He stayed in the city and was on his own at age 16. He was married, had children, then divorced. He hit very low times that I wasn't even aware of. Alcohol, drugs and

rock & roll (he played guitar) ruined his life. His daughter disowned him and his ex-wife passed away. He still sees his son. He has grandchildren and great grandchildren that he has never met to this day.

My brothers and I moved away and we were too busy with our own lives and raising our own kids, so we lost track of Jim.

It was many years later that I was able to trace him down. He lived in one room in a commercial building and was caretaker in lieu of rent. He had been there for twenty years. He was a society dropout but was safe and ok.

Jim was always a loner throughout his life and was always a step away from homeless. Three years ago, a fire burned his building to the ground. He had nowhere to go and no means. His friend found him temporary shelter in a barn in the suburbs with no heat or transportation. Then he had to move out. This friend had contacts who helped him into a Salvation Army

men's shelter. The shelter got him case workers, medical help, a bed and meals. Again, temporary. The staff was wonderful and helped him get state aid.



They helped him apply for his Social Security at age 77 and assisted with getting an ID and opening a bank account. Because he was elderly and not in the best health, he was able to have one of only twenty beds in the shelter, which is mainly a day center. Last year, the case workers found him affordable housing in a semi-assisted, senior community just outside the city. He now has his own little apartment. They serve lunch daily with a meal plan and provide food and supplies during the day for residents to take. They also have a shuttle bus for shopping. Jim is still adjusting and prefers to be left alone but, thanks to the Salvation Army, he is alive and safe. They are the real deal if you are looking for a reputable charity. PARADISE LOST Part 2 (Wasting Away Again in Margaritaville)

Well, I ended part 1 of this article last month with a line from Bob Dylan, "The times they are a-changing" and the big change coming to Flagler Beach is undoubtedly "the new kid in town" - Compass by Margaritaville. This new 17 million dollar, three story, 100 room resort/hotel will include a restaurant, a

pool with a tiki bar, meeting and retail spaces, a fitness room and rooftop terrace. It is being built on the site of the Flagler Beach Hotel which opened July 4, 1925, and was torn down in 1972. The Flagler Beach Hotel had four floors, 44 rooms with running water (a pretty big deal back then), a restaurant, grand ballroom, and a basement called "the arcade" that housed many business and events throughout the year. The Flagler Beach Hotel was considered very glamorous, attracting guests from all over the country.

Compass by Margaritaville will (just like the Flagler Beach Hotel was) be not only the geographic center of Flagler Beach and a prominent social center as well. Being the center usually sounds like a good spot unless of course it's the bullseye on a target at a shooting range - which makes me wonder: "what the target is that attracted such an expensive lavish resort/hotel to our little town in the first place?" Flagler Beach is a little funky laid-back community with "mom and pop" restaurants, hotel/motels, bars, and small retailers - and we love it that way. Our beaches need repair; the pier is torn up (again); A1A (the main road) has been destroyed twice in the last 8 years; and, we don't have enough parking. I think the Jimmy Buffet I grew up hearing about would have liked Flagler Beach just the way it is.

I was born and raised in Miami, spending a lot of time fishing and drinking in the Keys. The man, the myth and the music of Jimmy Buffet paints a picture of people wearing cut offs, tee shirts and flip flops, while wandering around the bottom of a glass looking for that long-lost shaker of salt that exists in the imaginary world of Margaritaville. I have to confess that I was beginning to lose faith in Jimmy and Margaritaville but writing this article helped save my illusions. I found out that Jimmy and his family are only part owners (28%) of an Orlando based company that licenses products, resorts, restaurants, and even "55 and older" communities using Jimmy's name and fame. The real owner (and thus culprits) of our soon to be Compass by Margaritaville is a group of fat cats that own multiple hotels in Daytona. Somehow that seems to help and I can still picture Jimmy wandering down a beach somewhere in the hereafter with a guitar strung across his back and a margarita in hand.

I'm not sure which old adage works best here; "The more things change the more they stay the same" or "If you forget your history you're doomed to repeat it". But either way, as it is written, "There's nothing new under the sun". So here, under the Flagler Beach sun, once upon a time (and not that long ago), there was a large flamboyant over-the-top hotel that didn't seem to fit the area in its time any more than the Compass by Margaritaville seems to fit now. I wonder if that's why they tore it down.

P.S. This was going to be 2 parts, but it's growing. In part 3, I'll interview my Aunt Barbara who was born, raised and still lives in Flagler Beach. She also lived and worked in the Flagler Beach Hotel!

WELCOME "LIBBY"

I want to tell you about my latest discovery! No longer do I have to physically go to the library or buy books online. All I do now is download the book I want to read from my local library...free of charge! I can choose the latest novels, or the classics, without

any fees. I can even borrow magazines.

It's all because of "LIBBY," a free app where you can enjoy e-books, digital audiobooks, and magazines from your public library. You can stream titles with Wi-Fi or mobile data, or download them for offline use (iPhone, iPad) and read anytime, anywhere. All you need to get started is a library card.

Yes, LIBBY is completely free to install, and all the digital content from your library in LIBBY is free to borrow with a valid library card. There are no subscription costs, no in-app purchases, and no late fees. (Digital titles are automatically returned on their due dates.)

LIBBY works with public libraries that lend digital titles. I have already checked with the Palm Coast library. The librarian was very helpful in explaining how it all works.

Your library chooses which digital titles they would like to provide in LIBBY. They also set lending policies, like how long you can borrow titles and how many you can borrow at a time.

- Step 2: In LIBBY, follow the prompts to find your library and sign in with a library card.
- Step 3: Browse your library's catalog, then borrow a book or audiobook or open a magazine. Your selection will vary based on your library, since each library chooses what titles and formats to offer in LIBBY.
- Step 4: Borrowed titles appear on your 'Shelf,' in the navigation footer. You will also find your magazine subscriptions and kept magazine issues on the 'Magazine Rack' on your Shelf.

Book and audiobook loans are downloaded to the app automatically when you are connected to Wi-Fi.

NOTE: To save space on your device, magazines do not automatically download, but you can manually download individual issues.

I checked the Flagler Beach Library and the librarian indicated that they have a small collection ...about 500 titles that can be borrowed through another app called "BOUNDLESS".

I have two library apps ...LIBBY and HOOPLA... downloaded on both my cellphone and iPad, and I love it!

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NATIONAL PEACHES & CREAM DAY

National Peaches and Cream Day is celebrated annually on June 21 by recognizing a sweet way to eat ripened peaches. Most fruits complement chilled cream well. Peaches 'n' Cream can be eaten with some homemade vanilla ice cream.

The sweetness of the fruit and the smoothness of the cream will tickle your taste buds and leave you wanting more.

Peaches have been around for many centuries. Native to China, peaches were taken to America in the 1500's via St. Augustine, Florida, by the Spanish explorers. In early times, peaches were called "Persian Apples". Now, peaches are the second biggest fruit crop in the U.S. after apples and have over 700 varieties!

What are the benefits of peaches, you ask? Peaches are packed with nutrients, aid in digestion, improve heart health and skin quality, and much more. They can even aid in alleviating some allergy symptoms. They average about 37 calories per medium peach, and provide 6% and 15% of your daily vitamin A and C recommended intake, along with vitamins E and K, folate, iron, potassium, and magnesium.

Here is one of my favorite ways to eat peaches and cream... in cake form! It's an easy recipe that turns out DELISH! Enjoy! Let me know if you make it!

Peaches 'n Cream Cake, Servings: 12

Ingredients

1 cup sugar, divided 3/4 cup butter, softened 3 eggs

1 cup flour

1 teaspoon baking powder 3/4 teaspoon salt, divided

1 teaspoon vanilla

2 tablespoons peach syrup

4 oz cream cheese, softened

1 1/4 cup sour cream, divided

29 ounces canned sliced peaches in heavy syrup

2 tablespoons brown sugar

1 teaspoon cinnamon

1/4 teaspoon nutmeg

Instructions

- 1. Preheat oven to 325 degrees.
- 2. Drain peaches, reserving 2 tablespoons peach syrup for cake batter. Reserve peaches in bowl for later use in the topping.

- 3. Cream 2/3 cup sugar and butter. Beat in 2 eggs. Combine flour, baking powder and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Add to creamed mixture and beat until well mixed. Stir in vanilla and peach syrup. Spread evenly on bottom of ungreased 10-inch pie plate.
- 4. Cream remaining 1/3 cup sugar with the cream cheese. Beat in 1/4 cup sour cream. Add remaining 1 egg and 1/4 teaspoon salt; mix well. Spoon over batter in pie plate. Bake 30-35 mi.
- 5. Remove from oven and add topping.
- 6. For topping: Arrange peach slices on top of hot cake. Blend remaining 1 cup sour cream with brown sugar, cinnamon and nutmeg. Spoon over peaches and return cake to oven for 5 minutes. Remove from oven and cool completely. Refrigerate to chill cake completely before serving, about 2 hours.

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14 ALDI SHOPPING TIPS

Tips, tricks, hacks, and secrets about
Aldi that only the employees know
about. Aldi keeps its costs down in
many ways but that cost does not
trickle down to the quality of a
product. It only trickles down to your

savings. Let's move on to the shopping secrets.

1. Aldi Spices

One of my favorite things about Aldi is its spices. For example, their bagel seasoning is the same bagel seasoning that you will find at Trader Joe's, but it is about a fourth of the cost. All of their seasonings are made in the McCormick factories. However, the cost is a fraction of the cost of the McCormick name brand.

2. The best day to shop at Aldi - Wednesdays

According to my personal use of Aldi and scouring the internet, the best day to shop at Aldi is Wednesdays. This is when they refresh many of their items and when they start rolling out their fun seasonal items. Once they are gone, they don't tend to replenish them.

3. Buying Produce

These days, their produce is the same quality as it is in other brand stores, and a lot of times, I find that they have the same product as the bigger name stores, but they are a fourth of the cost. So if there's one thing you should buy at Aldi, it is their produce.

4. Buying Toiletries

While I highly recommend that you buy all of your produce and your meats at Aldi, stay away from their toiletry items. I find that their toiletry items are more expensive than they can be at other stores. So make sure you check the prices.

5. Shopping Carts

You do need a quarter to use the cart at Aldi. This is to cut down the cost of hiring a separate person just to gather the carts in the parking lot. When you return your cart you get your quarter back. If you don't have a quarter, all you have to do is tell an employee you forgot your quarter. They will give you a quarter or give you a cart that already has a quarter in it. They don't want you to go home just because you need a quarter.

6. Checkout

One of the other things that I love about Aldi is that the checkout process is always fast and the people are very nice. The reason for this is the employees get timed on how long they are with each customer and how long it takes them to scan items. So Aldi does keep track of how many items the cashiers scan per minute because

they want their checkout process to go as fast as possible.

7. Bagger

There is no bagger. You take your items and you go to the front of the store where there's a little shelf thing and you bag your own items. You can buy a bag in the checkout line or bring your own.

8. Cashier

The Aldi cashier can change the price of the items as needed without calling the manager. Say you get an item, a bag of apples, and one apple is bruised but you still want the entire bag. You can ask for a special discount on the bag of apples and the cashier should be able to discount that item specifically for you.

9. Buying Milk

Like Costco, Aldi has items that they take a loss on just so they can get you in the store. Hoping that if they get you in the store, you will buy other items. One of those items is milk.

10. Double-back guarantee

Another thing that I love about Aldi is their double-back guarantee. If you get a product that is not up to your satisfaction, all you do is return it and they will not only give you a new product, but they will give you your money back for that original product. That means they stand by the quality of their product.

11. Check prices on name-brand items

Aldi does sell name-brand products, but often name-brand items are priced more than the big box stores. So stick to the basics when shopping at Aldi. The only downfall that I can see in my eyes about Aldi is they do not accept manufacturer's coupons.

12. Chocolate

For those of you that don't know, Aldi originated in Europe. They have fancy European chocolates at amazing prices. If you love chocolate, Aldi chocolate is the best chocolate out there for the price.

13. Wick candles

Another bonus tip is that I have heard that the three Wick candles at Aldi are better than the three Wick candles at Bath and Bodyworks.

14. Aldi weekly flyer

Aldi has weekly specials, but they are not nationally the same weekly specials. Be sure to check out the ads at your local Aldi to see what are the specials for that week.
