felt safe during the entire cruise Our previous cruise was cancelled in December 2020, so we rescheduled for December 2021. Different protocols were set in place by the cruise lines. One was mandatory vaccinations in which you had to have a vaccination card as proof of being vaccinated. We were both vaccinated so no problems with that. The other was proof of a negative covid test within 24 hours of boarding. We did that Thursday before our cruise on Saturday. Thank goodness we were both negative so off we went on a Saturday morning with our friends Rich and MaryAnn. We drove to Ft. Lauderdale, Port Everglades to begin our adventure. Our ship was Sky Princess and what a beauty she was. Our boarding was expedited as everything needs to be filled out online on their app to facilitate safe boarding. No papers except for our passport, vaccination card, and proof of negative covid test. After going through security, we received our medallion. You may say, what is a medallion? Princess cruise lines is the only cruise line currently with this technology. Princess medallion is a quarter sized wearable device that enables touch free boarding, locating others in your party on the ship as well as enhanced delivery service wherever you are. The medallion device helps the cruise staff find you so



they can deliver, drinks, snacks, or other services directly to you. You can even order on your stateroom TV or the mini portals located in multiple public areas around the ship. Also, a nice feature is your cabin door unlocks as soon as you approach allowing easy stateroom entry so no using

a card to open. And the staff knows when you leave your room to facilitate cleaning. All your purchases on board the ship is no touch as just a quick scan of your medallion is required. We were also impressed with how professional, attentive, and courteous the entire crew were in attempting to make your experience as safe and fun as possible while always wearing a mask. And an A plus for the cleaning crew. Mandatory masking which I have to say was adhered to by most passengers. However, while sitting to eat or drink you could remove the mask. You could also remove your mask while in your stateroom and by the pool and outside decks if social distancing. While walking anywhere inside the ship in public areas, always a mask. And the ship was only half the percentage of passengers of a regular pre-covid cruise. Every port of call was well organized following very strict covid protocols. No mask- no service. We felt safe with the entire experience and didn't want to get off the ship and go home. 

- Saturday, January 29 was the Community Connect





emergency. Once 911 has been called they will be able to get in and get the help that is needed and perhaps save your life. If they




must break a window or door down to get to you it will be at great expense to you. You can get more information regarding this at info@lockbox.com or by calling 1-800-552-5669. I highly recommend

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




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#### PROOFREADER RECOGNITION DAY-MARCH 8

## THE NYC ST. PATRICK'S DAY PARADE PIVOT

The St. Patrick's Day Parade is one of New York City's greatest traditions. The first parade was on March 17, 1762. I wasn't there for that one.

I had never thought about St. Patrick's Day until high school when

introduced to the tradition of wearing the "green" and marching in the NYC St. Patrick's Day parade.

In this Catholic all girl school, we had gym class once a week with a rather elderly parade enthusiast who happened to be Irish. Each week from September through early March, Mrs. O'Toole would attempt to teach us synchronized marching and the pivot. "Now girls you must maintain a steady foot beat in order to stay in formation. When a street turn is necessary, you must pivot properly. Those on the outer end of the line will be moving more quickly than those in the inner curve of the line. Always glance out of the corner of your eye to make sure everyone is still in proper formation. We must maintain precision marching! Get it? "We all said yes but were clueless.

The "pivot" was the cross to bear. The blocks in Manhattan were very wide and to turn down a street while marching was quite an effort. The girl on the inside acted as a hinge while the rest of us were the gate. Unfortunately, I was not the hinge but the end person of the gate!

On that March 17, 1962, the weather was a cold and windy 25 degrees. We were not allowed to wear our winter coats. The only attire aside from our gabardine uniform was a green blazer which had the school emblem bright white and clearly stitched on the breast pocket. This way

all could see what a wonderful school we attended. We sported green beanie caps on our heads. The buses left us off at our appointed area. Our Commander-In-Chief, Mrs. O'Toole shouted out, "Assume your line positions and begin marching!"

Everything was going pretty well until we reached the Fifth Avenue turn. At first, we were all in-sync and then it happened. I was on the end and keeping up with the others making the turn when a sudden gust of wind caught my beanie. I looked up and grabbed it. That move pretty much changed our precision marching.

Each of us was now moving at different speeds. The girl next to me was staring at me yelling pivot...faster... pivot! I found myself not marching but running to keep up with the line. It was quite a sight. We finally executed the turn to the amusement of all the bystanders. I was mortified, but thankful that Mrs. O'Toole missed the whole incident.

That night my mother greeted me at the door smiling. I had no plans of telling her what happened. However, that did not matter, as the parade was televised, and she and the rest of the family witnessed my embarrassing escapade on NBC.

To this day when my husband and I are out walking and making a street turn, I call out ..."PIVOT!"

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#### **CELEBRATING IRISH CUISINE**

In the US, we usually celebrate St. Patrick's Day with corned beef and cabbage. What most Americans don't know is that corned beef and cabbage did not originate in Ireland! When the Irish immigrated to the U.S., they faced severe discrimination and lived

in slums alongside Jewish and Italian groups. It was at Jewish delis and lunch carts that the Irish experienced corned beef and noticed its similarity to Irish bacon. The Irish learned to cook the corned beef with cabbage in one pot, making it cheap and easy to prepare.

Here is an alternative recipe for you to try (and one of my favorites). Irish Fish Pie is a great example of how the Irish utilize their local ingredients to create delicious, warming and filling meals. From the highest tables in the land to the humblest farmhouse, fish pie has been warming the hearts of the Irish for hundreds of years.

#### Irish Fish Pie

Servings: 6

#### **Ingredients**

2 1/2 pounds Yukon Gold or red potatoes, washed

1 pound salmon fillet

1 pound cod fillet, (or other white fish)

1 ½ cups milk

1 bay leaf

1-ounce fresh dill, chopped (or 1 tablespoon dry dill)

1/4 cup butter

1 large onion, chopped fine

1/4 cup flour

1 cup heavy cream

1/2-pound shrimp, large, thawed if frozen

1/2-pound cheddar cheese (preferably Irish Cheddar), shredded

Salt and pepper, (to taste)

#### **Instructions**

- 1. Cut washed potatoes into 1-inch cubes. Parboil for 8-10 minutes until tender but not breaking up; drain and set aside.
- 2. Put the salmon and cod, skin side up, in a skillet, pour over the milk, add bay leaf. Bring to boil then simmer for 3 minutes. Cover and remove from heat. Let stand for 5 minutes then transfer to a platter using a slotted spoon. Strain and reserve the cooking liquid.


- 3. Preheat the oven to 350 degrees. Butter (or use cooking spray) a large casserole dish.
- 4. Flake the fish into large chunks, removing skin and bones, and put in prepared casserole.
- 5. Melt butter in saucepan, add the onion and sauté for 3 minutes or until softened. Stir in the flour and cook for 1 minute. Remove from the heat and slowly add the reserved cooking liquid and the heavy cream. Return to medium heat and cook, stirring until thickened, smooth and just boiling. Remove from the heat and stir in the shrimp and dill. Season with salt and pepper, then pour over the fish.
- 6. Toss 2 tablespoons of butter with the potatoes. Season with salt and pepper. Scatter the potatoes over the fish pie. Cover with shredded cheese.
- 7. Bake casserole for about 30 minutes until the potatoes are golden and the sauce is bubbling.
- 8. Serve with fresh broccoli or green beans for a complete meal!

#### **Notes:**

- 1. Cut the richness of the creamy sauce by substituting 1% or 2% milk for the heavy cream.
- 2. For a different combination of flavors, try using a combination of smoked fish and fresh fish (such as haddock, grouper or flounder), add large sea scallops in place of shrimp, or use fresh parsley and not dill. Any combo of fish and shellfish elevate this dish to new levels!

Let us introduce ourselves, we are Anne and Keith Mowling and have lived at 5 Tobias Lane since 2014. As Canadian Snowbirds we are allowed to stay up to 180 days away from our Ontario home per calendar year in order to keep our Health Insurance intact.

We love our time in Plantation Oaks and are pleased to say we have met many who we are now proud to call friends. Many are interested to know more facts about Canada so we thought we would provide some information about your northern neighbour.

Canada became a country in 1867, with the first settlers being the Vikings in 1000 AD. Immigration grew by the early 1800 mainly from Great Britain and France and today Canada has 38 million people, of which 90% live within 100 miles of the border with the USA.

Canada is the second largest country in the world, after Russia, in square miles with 6 time zones from coast to coast, boasting the longest highway in the world 4500 miles stretching from Newfoundland to British Columbia.

Canada has 10 provinces and 3 territories with the longest coastline in the world bordering 3 oceans, Pacific, Arctic and Atlantic. With over 20% of the worlds freshwater, we have the largest number of freshwater lakes and rivers in the world, a real favorite to our southern friends who love to fish. Today many of these more popular areas are owned by Americans who love to fish and hunt, particularly in Ontario, Quebec and British Columbia. For 36 years we had a home on one of these lakes north of Toronto and several of our neighbours were from Michigan, Pennsylvania, New York, and Ohio.

Canada is a Parliamentary Democracy following the English System with 4 principal parties, Liberal, Conservative, New Democratic Party (Heavy Union Support) and The Green Party (Environmentalists). In our elections the leader of the winning party becomes Prime Minister. Our current Prime Minister is Justin Trudeau age 51 (Young!!!) who is married with 3 children. He was first elected in 2015 and is the son of a former Prime Minister Pierre Elliot Trudeau who was Prime Minister from 1968-1984, meaning that we do not limit the time in office to two 4-year terms.

Our currency is Dollars with a current value of 78 cents

to your USA dollar. In 2015 we discontinued minting the penny and replaced the One- and Two-Dollar bills with coins calling a 1 dollar coin a Loonie and a 2 Dollar coin a Toonie. Our Piggy Banks love this move. Our country is Metric, so please when you come to see us don't think the speed limit is 100 miles an Hour. It is 100 kilometres per hour or 60 miles an hour. Also, when you hear the temperature is 28 degrees in July please leave your snow skis at home as 28\* Celsius is 82\* F.
