For several years Bob helped a friend build a 46-foot trimaran in his back yard. With that experience in his pocket Bob decided to tackle the same task and build a trimaran in their back yard. Four years later he and

When Bob retired, they bought a 27-foot sailboat on the California coast and trailered it to Ft. Lauderdale, FL. They spent 3 months sailing around the Bahamas. But wait! That experience opened their eyes and nudged them to fulfill their dream of blue water sailing. They returned to Sacramento, CA, sold the boat and house,

kept the car, and headed for the East Coast to find a BIG sailboat. If you can replace your sliding doors with those it instantly adds class. I wasn't able to do that at the time, but I still wanted the look. Now I was convinced that you could purchase these grids already made to snap

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into your sliding door. Ed, my husband insisted there was no such product. So, after trying to find the grids I admitted he may be right. He and I measured for the small panes just like they are in French doors. Together we used white electrical tape to map out the window minions. Now close up it doesn't fool anyone but to me it is the next best thing to French Doors. You really can't do this without help, and a good eye for measuring for the panes.

The next project was replacing that indoor outdoor horrible carpeting in the lanai. I decided to rip it out and thought of ways to finish the cement floor. For a few hundred dollars I could tile the floor, or I thought I could paint the cement floor. How boring would that be. So, I decided to do a checkerboard pattern for more interest. I looked at quite a few You Tube videos to learn how



to do this. They said to mark off the floor with tape but unless you have smooth concrete this won't produce sharp lines. I used a 12×12 tile and a pencil started in the middle and went to the wall from there. Dividing the room in half helped also. One

error I made was not sealing the work when done so it did not stay looking fresh. I have since redone each square and put 2 coats of sealer on the floor.

AMERICAN GOULASH

This is an easy old-fashioned comforting meal that is perfect for our chilly Florida months and even for potluck. Everything cooks in the same pot including the pasta. Delicious!!

Ingredients

- *2 pounds of ground beef, ground turkey or ground sausage, or any combo
- *1 large onion diced
- *4 cloves of garlic minced
- *3 cups of water
- *1 tablespoon of beef base or bouillon
- *2 15-ounce cans tomato sauce
- *2 15-ounce cans diced tomatoes
- *3 bay leaves
- *3 tablespoons of soy sauce
- *1 tablespoon seasoned salt
- *2 tablespoons Italian Seasoning
- *2 teaspoons of paprika
- *1/2 teaspoon of black pepper
- *2 cups of macaroni noodles uncooked
- *1 cup of cheddar cheese shredded
- *fresh Italian parsley chopped

Instructions

- 1. Brown ground meat of your choice in a large stockpot. Remove from pan and drain. Leave about ½ tablespoons grease in the pan. Add the diced onion and cook for about 5 minutes heat until tender. Add the garlic and cook another minute.
- 2. Return cooked meat to the pot along with the water, beef base, cans of tomatoes and sauce, soy sauce, bay leaves, seasoned salt, Italian seasoning, paprika, and black pepper. Stir together and bring to a boil, reduce to low, and simmer 20 minutes.
- 3. Stir in the noodles, cover, and simmer 15-20 minutes or until al dente. Stir occasionally to prevent noodles from sticking to the bottom.
- 4. Just before serving, stir in the cheese. Serve garnished with fresh parsley.

MAY IS MENTAL HEALTH AWARENESS MONTH

I received a note from a dear friend, and it touched me and enlightened me so much I asked permission to share some of it with you. Our hope is that if you are going through this it may help you to know that you are not alone.

"My thought is that people with the problem, and even their caregiver(s),

hide mental problems to protect their loved ones even from their closest family/friends until the problem becomes too obvious to hide. The people with mental health problems when they have a moment of clarity, are embarrassed. My wife always felt that people treated her differently like her thoughts/opinions had no value.

I learned the hiding/embarrassment firsthand with my buddy. She very much depended on me to support her. I did, of course, even using the cards that you printed without her knowledge or breaking into a discussion when I realized she was stuck, or the topic had gone off the rails. (The card read "My wife has Alzheimer's disease. She might say or do things that are unexpected. Thank you for your understanding.") I tried to distract her each time that I felt the need to distribute the cards. It took me a while to understand how I got away with it without her knowledge and finally realized that it was because she trusted me and because her attention was less focused from day to day. I still needed to be careful so as not to embarrass her.

On a very personal note, now Florida State government is discussing opening LTC and mental health facilities (our most vulnerable citizens) with the virus still not under control by evidence of the daily posted numbers and schools opening and closing a few days later for two weeks. I'd love to be able to give my wife hugs and maybe a kiss but feel very ambivalent at this time. We've been most fortunate that her facility has provided excellent care for her and helped me with my struggle. "


Try to start conversations especially if you notice that they're starting fewer conversations themselves. It can

help to:

- speak clearly and slowly, using short sentences
- make eye contact with the person when they're talking or asking questions
- give them time to respond, because they may feel pressured if you try to speed up their answers
- encourage them to join in conversations with others, where possible
- let them speak for themselves during discussions about their welfare or health issues
- try not to patronize them, or ridicule what they say
- acknowledge what they have said, even if they do not answer your question, or what they say seems out of context – show that you've heard them and encourage them to say more about their answer
- give them simple choices avoid creating complicated choices or options for them
- use other ways to communicate such as rephrasing questions because they cannot answer in the way they used to



I enjoy reading the "POP" and one of my favorite columns is Garden Club Dirt. I like reading about gardening because although I'm reasonably skilled in some areas, growing things does not make the list. I tried for twenty years to grow tomatoes and failed. I tried mulching,

per-fertilized soil, heritage tomatoes, hi-bred tomatoes, upside down planting, in ground, in pots, and even bought plants with green tomatoes already on them but I have yet to eat a single tomato that I have grown. If I had been a farmer, I would have been two or three steps below Oliver Wendell Douglas on Green Acres.

Judy (Garden Club Dirt, author) told us that March's "favorite plant" was the Crown of Thorns which is a plant that I am familiar with. At our house in Miami, we had two large cement pots on the front porch in which I tried (and failed) to grow anything for years until I discovered the Crown of Thorns. I had had lunch on

Miami Beach one day and when leaving the restaurant/bar noticed a cement pot with a pretty, red flowered, thorny plant. What really caught my eye was the trash, cigarette butts, gum and left-over drink containers that had been dumped into that pot and yet the plant was thriving. I knew immediately that it was the perfect plant for me.

The next day I went to a nursery and purchased two Crown of Thorns and to really increase the odds had one of my nephews plant them for me. For more that fifteen years I have never fertilized, watered or changed the soil in those pots, and I am proud to say that those plants, in those pots, now reside in front of our Plantation Oaks house where I routinely ignore them. The Crown of Thorns plant is so well named because like the Savior's love they are indestructible.

In closing I have to report that I have had more luck gardening here at the Oaks than anyplace else

I have ever lived. I now have a small herb garden with some basil, parsley, oregano, mint, sweet/hot peppers, rosemary and a few ornamentals but I'm not gonna push my luck, "NO TOMATOES"!!

(If you notice there's a theme we have going here, you guessed it, high life of my past, Shoney's and Dallas). With these corporations buying these parks, more than ever we need FMO. You are the FMO, if we don't have memberships, we don't have an FMO, and I don't think anyone of us want to

He said He always loved you, No matter what you've done. You don't need to win the fight for life, That's already been won.


You see we went the same way, That you have fallen for. Our sins hung like filthy rags, But he opened up the door.

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
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
